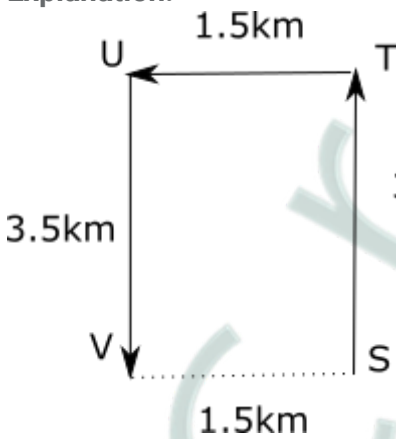

Subtracting second equation from first equation, we get $10c = 12$ or $c = 1.2$

Answer: D

Explanation:

Since the ratio of sides is given as 4:5:6, let the side of the triangle be $4y, 5y$ and $6y$.

The perimeter is given as 90. Thus,

$$90 = 4y + 5y + 6y = 15y$$

$$\Rightarrow y = 6.$$

Thus, the sides are 24, 30, 36.

Area of the triangle by Heron's formula $= \sqrt{s(s-a)(s-b)(s-c)} = 357.14$, where s is the semiperimeter and a, b, c are the sides of the triangle.

Since no options satisfy the answer, option D none of these is correct.

sum of first 5 numbers = $S_5 = 10 \times 5 = 50$

Thus the sum of the next 2 numbers= $S_7 - S_5 = 70 - 50 = 20$

Therefore, average of the remaining 2 numbers = $S_2/2 = 20/2 = 10$
